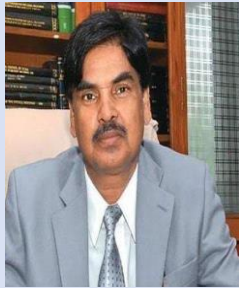

#### CONCEPT -NOTE-

The Directive Principles of State Policy (DPSPs) enshrined in the Constitution of India represent a pivotal framework guiding the government towards achieving a just and equitable society. They are integral to the vision of a welfare state, aiming to fulfill socio-economic rights and promote overall well-being. Although the DPSPs are not legally enforceable, their significance lies in shaping legislation and policies that align with the goal of social justice.

The DPSPs, contained in Part IV of the Indian Constitution, set forth a comprehensive set of objectives intended to guide state policy and governance. They encompass a broad range of goals, including the promotion of economic and social welfare, the enhancement of public health and education, and the assurance of fair distribution of resources. The ultimate aim is to bridge the gap between the fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution and the socio-economic realities faced by the population. The DPSPs are categorized into various spheres of socio-economic development. For instance:

Adequate Livelihood and Economic Welfare: Principles such as ensuring a living wage for workers,

improving standards of living, and promoting economic growth are emphasized. The government is encouraged to formulate policies that foster equitable distribution of wealth and resources, thereby reducing economic disparities. Education and Health Care: The DPSPs stress the need for universal access to education and health services. By advocating for free and compulsory education for children and the promotion of public health, these principles aim to improve the quality of life and provide opportunities for all citizens to thrive. Social Justice: Ensuring social justice through measures like the eradication of poverty, the upliftment of marginalized communities, and the promotion of social welfare schemes are crucial aspects of the DPSPs. The principles seek to create an inclusive society where all individuals have the opportunity to contribute to and benefit from economic progress.

**Influence on Legislation and Policy-Making:** While DPSPs are not justiciable, meaning they cannot be enforced in a court of law, they significantly influence the legislative and policy-making process. Governments are expected to incorporate these principles into their policy frameworks and legislative agendas. For instance, numerous laws and schemes, such as the Right to Education Act and various social welfare programs, are designed to reflect the ideals espoused by the DPSPs. These policies are crafted with the intention of aligning with the broader vision of social justice and equity.

The relationship between DPSPs and Fundamental Rights is symbiotic. While Fundamental Rights guarantee individual liberties, the DPSPs provide a framework for realizing these rights in a broader socio-economic context. The principles guide the government in formulating policies that aim to ensure that the benefits of economic development reach all sections of society, thereby complementing the constitutional commitment to justice, equality, and fraternity.

The effective implementation of DPSPs often faces challenges, such as resource constraints, political will, and administrative capacity. Despite these challenges, the principles serve as a moral compass for governance and policy-making. They are essential in ensuring that development efforts are directed towards creating an equitable society, addressing the needs of the disadvantaged, and fostering inclusive growth. The Directive Principles of State Policy play a crucial role in guiding the Indian government towards achieving socio-economic justice. By outlining clear objectives for governance and policy-making, they contribute to the creation of a more just and equitable society, where the benefits of development are shared broadly and social welfare is prioritized.

## SUB-THEMES: -

1. Right to Adequate Livelihood: How DPSPs ensure the right to an adequate standard of living by promoting economic and social welfare policies.
2. Universal Education: The role of DPSPs in mandating free and compulsory education for children and its impact on socio-economic development.
3. Healthcare and Social Services: The principles guiding the state in providing access to healthcare and other essential social services to improve public health and well-being.
4. Economic Equality and Social Justice: How DPSPs aim to reduce economic disparities and promote social justice through policies and regulations.
5. Workers' Rights and Employment: The influence of DPSPs on ensuring fair wages, safe working conditions, and employment opportunities.
6. Land Reforms and Rural Development: The directive principles related to land reforms and rural development, and their impact on agrarian society and rural livelihoods.
7. Housing and Urban Development: The role of DPSPs in promoting affordable housing and urban planning to address housing shortages and improve living conditions.
8. Environmental Protection and Sustainable Development: How DPSPs guide environmental protection efforts and sustainable development practices to ensure long-term socio-economic well-being.
9. Empowerment of Marginalized Groups: The principles aimed at empowering women, scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, and other marginalized communities.
10. Social Security and Welfare Programs: The contribution of DPSPs to the development and implementation of social security schemes and welfare programs.

11. Making corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) mandatory in India but not DPSPs : CSP & DPSP both aim to promote societal welfare, but they operate at different levels. CSR refers to the responsibilities that businesses have towards society, including ethical practices and contributions to community development. DPSP ,Part of Indian Constitution, guides the state in making policies for the welfare of its citizens focusing on economics and Social Justice.

Main Title should be in full capitals, bold and centered 12 point font.Sub-titles should be in sentence case, bold and 12 point font. Author's nameshould be in small capitals and centered 12 point font Footnotes should be inTimesNewRoman12-pointfont.

9. Citation Format: Please use footnotes rather than endnotes. Footnotes should conform to The Indian Law Institute, New Delhi Style;
10. Submission of the abstract: A cover letter with the name(s) of the author(s) and address, designation, institution/affiliation, the title of the manuscript and contact information (email, phone, etc.) is compulsory to submit. All submissions must contain an abstract of not more than 300 words with 5 Minimum Keywords;
11. Any plagiarized work will be more than 20% rightly rejected;
12. The title of the Chapter should be followed by Name, Designation, Name of the Organization / University / Institution and Email address. It is mandatory to mention the Email address, as all future correspondence will be through it;
13. Name and details of Co-author, if any;
14. The paper should be typed in MS WORD format (preferably 2007 or 2010);
15. The paper must be in single column layout with margins justified on both sides;
16. The length of the paper for short Paper below 4,000 words (including footnotes) and long paper not more than 7000 (Including Footnotes).
